These past few months have held unexpected challenges, heartache, and multiple stresses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In May, as NYS Pause entered Phase 1, hope was re-ignited, but tensions increased for those who had to wait for Phases 2-4. Warmer weather arrived and spirits brightened, yet there was also the risk and fear of more cases of COVID-19. On Memorial Day weekend, we remembered those who made, and are making, tremendous sacrifices by fighting for freedom and peace around our world. Hearts have been heavy.

This past week brought even greater heartache, anger, disbelief, and a whole host of other emotions over the brutal killing of George Floyd by a white police officer. People all over the country have come together – in both peaceful demonstrations and in violent ones. We saw both of these firsthand this weekend right here at home. We saw a peaceful protest against violence and racism where people of all ethnicities and backgrounds came together in solidarity to say change needs to happen now, violence needs to end now, and racism needs to be openly and honestly addressed now. Yet later, violent protests causing horrible destruction overshadowed the message of the first gathering. Our hearts are heavy.

I pray all of you remain safe. These acts of violence are traumatizing for so many – students, families, educators, and the community at large. Coping with this along with the stress of the coronavirus pandemic can be overwhelming. Please know that the teachers, Mrs. Conrow our social worker, and I are here for you. We will be sharing more resources as we receive them but know that some we put on our website to help deal with the coronavirus may help now, too.
